




The Motorsport NZ Elite Academy Newsletter. March 2019.

What a rollercoaster! The CMC Markets and MacClures ITM Toyota 86 has had an abundance of action this season. The team has worked diligently, moving from 16th overall after suffering a DNF and in turn a severely damaged car in Round 1, to 4th overall in an extremely close and competitive championship. We have had our share of bad luck but also a great amount of success, gaining a pole position at Pukekohe, an overall round, overall rookie and feature race win at Highlands Motorsport Park as well as multiple other podiums throughout. Both my successes perseverance through low points of the championship has to be accredited to the Elite Motorsport Academy. Their post-camp Improved Performance Programme has proved vital in my development as a driver and ambassador. I am working with a great variety of mentors. Over the past 5 months I have gained a huge amount of experience behind the wheel, it has been amazing being able to put what I have learnt from the academy into use in so many variaties.

After training with McElrea Racing on their Motion Force 1 Simulator, I competed at the Phillip Island (Melbourne, Australia) Qualifying round for the Aussie Driver Search Pro Competition. After driver the 2011 FPR V8 Supercar I was extremely proud to hear I had placed in the Top 6 out of 250+ Drivers heading to the final at Wakefield Park (NSW, Australia).

Back in New Zealand I turned my focus to competing in Round 1 of the BNT V8's at the Auckland ITM Supersprint (Pukekohe Raceway). After claiming Pole position I came away from the weekend with a clean sweep winning all 3 races and ultimately claiming 3rd in the Overall Championship.

After a full day testing in Wayne Anderson's Ford Supertourer I was ready for the Aussie Driver Search Final when for the first time I really saw how tough my competitors were. Making it through to the Top 10 I was eliminated driving the 2014 Tekno V8 Supercar before the top 3.

Once again back in New Zealand after this huge experience I have been working as a driver trainer and planning my upcoming 1hr Races in the ENEOS North Island Endurance Championship.
